The Department of English is proposing a change in the course description for ENG 6800: Gothic and Horror Literature.

Course Description

From:

This course analyzes psychological and physical horror in British and American Gothic and horror literature, including short stories, novels, some narrative poetry. Analysis of Gothic trappings and creatures such as vampires and werewolves as they appear in literature.

To:

This course explores the rich and varied traditions of gothic and horror literature, tracing their evolution from the 18th century to contemporary works. Students will engage with key themes such as the supernatural, the uncanny, the monstrous, and the psychological depths of fear and desire. Major topics include the exploration of identity and the self, the fragility of human reason, the horrors of isolation, and the intersection of gothic aesthetics with societal anxieties about race, gender, and power.

Rationale for Change:

The new description provides a clearer historical framework for these literary genres and does not limit the material to British and American. It also gives a more accurate overview of the key themes and topics that the course will engage.
